Impeachment by Prior Inconsistent Statement

Commit, Credit, Confront

Triggering Event: ANY statement that is inconsistent with a prior statement

Example¹: Q: You arrived at class shortly before 1pm?

A: No I didn't. / No, I got there just after 1pm. / I don't know.

COMMIT

- 1. Your testimony today is that you arrived at class just after 1pm? (Yes)
- 2. Your testimony today is that you did not arrive at class just before 1pm? (Yes)

CREDIT

Deposition

(choose a series of applicable questions)

- 1. This isn't the first time you've been asked questions about this case?
- 2. You gave a deposition in this case?
- 3. On [date]?
- 4. You were asked questions at the deposition?
- 5. That was [#of months] after the incident?
- 6. That was closer in time to the events here?
- 7. You took an oath?
- 8. An oath to tell the truth?
- 9. That's the same oath you took here today?
- 10. You had a chance to review the transcript?
- 11. You made no changes?

Statement Not Under Oath

(choose a series of applicable questions)

- 1. This is not the first time you've talked about/discussed this case?
- 2. You gave a statement in this case?
- 3. A statement at [location of statement]? On [date]?
- 4. That was [# of weeks/months] after the incident?
- 5. That was closer in time to the events in this case than we are today?
- 6. You described the events of the [incident]?
- 7. You had an opportunity to review your statement?
- 8. You had an opportunity to make changes if needed?
- 9. You made no changes?
- 10. You signed your statement?
- 11. Your signature affirms it as your statement?

¹ Before impeaching by prior inconsistent sworn testimony, you should first attempt to illicit the testimony without referring to the prior statement. In-court testimony is usually better than impeachment.

CONFRONT

Deposition

- 1. Referring court and counsel to page [#], line(s) [#] of [witness'] deposition.
- 2. At that deposition, you were asked the following question and gave the following answer: Question: "What time did you arrive at class?" Answer: "Just before 1pm" Did I read that correctly?

Statement Not Under Oath

- 1. Referring court and counsel to [witness'] statement, paragraph [#],
- 2. In that statement, you made the following claim: I arrived at class just before 1pm. Did I read that correctly?
